Sustainable Horticulture

The Sustainable Horticulture Certificate program consists of core courses that include Basic and Advanced Horticulture, Soils, Diagnosing Plant Problems, and Botany for Gardeners. You will learn the best management practices necessary for gardening with minimal ecological impact, and how to protect soil health, water resources and air quality. You can choose from a series of electives that will enhance your understanding of sustainable practices. Learn how to use the land properly and create aesthetically pleasing gardens.

Landscape and Garden Design

The Landscape and Garden Design Certificate program prepares you to apply basic design principles and techniques to create attractive, environmentally responsible landscapes. Using graphic skills and plant knowledge, you will work through the design process to develop a finished presentation plan.
