Phipps Executive Director Richard V. Piacentini Receives Steinbrenner Institute Award of Merit Carnegie Mellon University honors local green innovator as a part of its 10th annual environmental engineering, science and policy Media Fellowship.

Pittsburgh, Pa. Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens is pleased to announce that Executive Director Richard V. Piacentini has been presented with a 2012 Award of Merit from the Carnegie Mellon University (CMU) <u>Steinbrenner Institute for Environmental Education and Research</u>. Established as part of the Institute's annual Media Fellowship for environmental journalists and editors, the award was presented during a special dinner program that was hosted at Phipps in collaboration with the Pittsburgh Regional Alliance and included a tour of the new <u>Center for Sustainable Landscapes</u> (CSL).

Designed to provide national media members with opportunities to expand upon their knowledge of sustainability issues and to interact with leading environmental engineers, scientists and policy analysts, the Steinbrenner Institute has been cultivating impactful relationships between such professionals for 10 years, shining a spotlight on the work of CMU faculty and other regional experts. The ultimate goal of the program is to secure press coverage and promote innovations conceived in the City of Pittsburgh.

While showcasing local talent, this year's Fellowship also highlighted the many sustainable advancements spurred by Piacentini – who, since his tenure began in 1994, has taken the lead on Phipps' green evolution, building the first LEED® certified visitor center in a public garden; the most energy-efficient tropical forest conservatory in the world; and the first LEED® for Existing Buildings Platinum certified production greenhouses. Phipps' latest accomplishment under his leadership is the CSL, a landmark facility that generates its own energy, and treats and reuses all water captured on site as Piacentini and his team strive to meet or exceed the highest green building and landscape standards.

"CMU has shown great interest in and support of the CSL since we broke ground, and I am really honored to have now received this Award of Merit from the prestigious Steinbrenner Institute," says Piacentini. "This Media Fellowship is so important because it not only draws national attention to the environmental problems we all face, but also raises awareness about the progressive solutions coming out of Pittsburgh that can help solve them. Designed and built by regional talent, the CSL is one of these local yet globally minded innovations, illuminating the many possibilities of green building and landscaping, and inspiring experts everywhere to push the envelope even further."
